REPORT OF THE TFQPH BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Tennessee Foundation for Quality Patient Healthcare (TFQPH) Board of Directors is comprised of six members and is chaired by Dr. Pamela Murray.

TFQPH is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization founded by the Tennessee Medical Association (TMA). TFQPH is organized and operated exclusively to support, benefit, or carry out the charitable purposes of TMA. In a manner that constitutes charitable, scientific, or educational purposes, TFQPH strives to promote high quality medical care and assist physicians and the public to improve the quality of care received by patients in the evolving healthcare environment. Through innovative programming, TFQPH addresses critical needs of healthcare professionals to promote effective leadership in medical practices, communities, and beyond.

In 2005, TFQPH was established to receive and manage a grant from The Physicians Foundation for the Tennessee Prescription Safety Program. Through the years, TFQPH has periodically managed grants for specific programs of TMA, including multiple prescriber education initiatives, quality improvement, and physician leadership. In 2023, both the TFQPH Board of Directors and the TMA Board of Trustees recognized the need for the foundation to expand and voted to launch a full, active fundraising program for the foundation. These expanded efforts include solicitation of program specific grants and donations and annual general funding campaigns. TFQPH will also begin efforts to build an endowment to guarantee long-term stability for the foundation and continuous support for TMA programs and education.

As a part of this effort, TMA is contracting with a fundraising consultant, Jennifer Chalos & Associates, to assist in planning structure for the new fundraising format of the foundation.

 In 2024, the Ingram Institute for Physician Leadership, long supported by program grants from The Physicians Foundation, learned that leadership program funding for state programs would be discontinued. This initiated TFQPH's first TMA member fundraising campaign, with the goal to support the Ingram Institute.

 The original goal of the campaign was to raise \$100,000 for the 2025 Ingram Institute program year. As of March 31, 2025, a total of \$97,500 has been either gifted or pledged to TFQPH, with gifts and pledges for 2025 totaling \$64,500, and future year commitments totaling \$33,000. As the campaign began, Dr. F. Michael Minch, TMA President 2011-2012, made a five-year

These programs continue to offer physicians opportunities to collaborate with each other and expand and hone skills and knowledge in the field of medicine beyond institutional 31 32 settings. Through the vision of Dr. John J. Ingram, TMA President 2004-2005, the Ingram 33 Institute's Physician Leadership Immersion Program (formerly the Physician Leadership College) 34 began in 2007 and has had 19 graduating classes. The Physician Leadership Lab was added in 2015 and has since had 10 graduating classes. There are over 300 combined alumni from both 35 36 programs. 37 38 The 2024 Ingram Institute for Physician Leadership concluded on July 27 with 22 new graduates. Physicians from across the state enrolled in TMA's 2024 Leadership Lab and Immersion program 39

A three-year OAC Community Grant for Prescriber Education was awarded to TFQPH in March 2024 and will provide funding from July 2024 – June 2027. Over the next three years, TFQPH will use the \$1.5 million dollar grant to create new and updated education for all prescribers in Tennessee. To accomplish this goal, TFQPH recruited a task force of 17 members comprised of physicians, physician assistants, and representatives from law enforcement, pharmacy, and public health, along with five subject-matter experts. The 17-member task force has been meeting monthly since December 2024 to set objectives and content for this new prescriber education and to identify requirements and restraints. The program content is scheduled to launch early Fall 2025.

The TMA Job Board for Tennessee Resident Physicians launched October 2024 and currently has 28 postings. The role of the TMA Job Board is to keep Tennessee trained physicians in state, while also helping TMA members fill practice needs for new physicians. Efforts are being made to increase awareness of, and reiterate the validity of, the process.
