#### **2025 MEMBERSHIP SUMMARY**

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#### MEMBERSHIP HIGHLIGHTS

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• Membership Video – The Tennessee Medical Association (TMA) produced and launched a new membership video in February 2025. The video highlights diverse members from across the state and the benefits of being a member. It features the current 'We Are TMA' theme introduced by President Landon Combs, MD. The video is accessible via TMA's social media platforms and on TMA's Join page. This video should boost credibility, attract attention and emotionally connect with prospective members by showcasing real-life testimonials.

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16 17 Nonmember Research – During the 2024-25 year, TMA initiated a market research
project with Avenue M Group aimed at nonmembers. The project uses polls and
interviews to understand physician awareness of TMA and perceived barriers to
joining the organization. Understanding why nonmembers are hesitant to join is
critical. Insights gathered can help in tailoring recruitment messages, addressing
misconceptions and removing obstacles in the membership process.

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 Group Visits – TMA has prioritized retention visits to the largest five groups in each region. These visits are often coordinated with recruitment efforts when possible. Targeted group visits reinforce relationships, address concerns directly, and create opportunities for customized solutions to enhance retention.

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 Group Recruitment – The past year has seen both new groups joining the TMA and a pool of promising proposals. Expanding group membership strengthens the collective influence, resource sharing, and community support. It also reflects the capacity to serve varied medical specialties and regions.
